



Episcopal Health Foundation Texas Social Determinants of Health

The Episcopal Health Foundation Texas Social Determinants of Health Survey was conducted by telephone October 10 – November 19, 2019 among a random representative sample of 1,200 adults age 18 and older living in the state of Texas (note: persons without a telephone could not be included in the random selection process). Interviews were administered in English and Spanish, combining random samples of both landline (356) and cellular telephones (844, including 653 who had no landline telephone). Sampling, data collection, weighting and tabulation were managed by SSRS in close collaboration with Episcopal Health Foundation researchers. Episcopal Health Foundation paid for the costs of the survey fieldwork and worked with SSRS to design the survey and analyze the results.

The dual frame cellular and landline phone sample was generated by Marketing Systems Group (MSG) using random digit dial (RDD) procedures. All respondents were screened to verify that they resided in Texas. For the landline sample, respondents were selected by asking for the youngest adult male or female currently at home based on a random rotation. If no one of that gender was available, interviewers asked to speak with the youngest adult of the opposite gender. For the cell phone sample, interviews were conducted with the qualifying adult who answered the phone.

A multi-stage weighting design was applied to ensure an accurate representation of the Texas adult population. The first stage of weighting involved corrections for sample design. In the second weighting stage, demographic adjustments were applied to account for systematic nonresponse along known population parameters. Population parameters included gender, age, race, marital status, Hispanicity (broken down by nativity), educational attainment, phone status (cell phone only or reachable by landline), and state region. Weighting parameters were based on estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau's 2017 American Community Survey (ACS), with the exception of population density of the respondent's county of residence which was based on the 2010 Census, and telephone use (cell phone-only, landline-only, dual-user) which was projected from the January-June 2016 National Health Interview Survey.

The margin of sampling error including the design effect for the full sample is plus or minus 4 percentage points. For results based on subgroups, the margin of sampling error may be higher. Sample sizes and margins of sampling error for subgroups are available by request. Note that sampling error is only one of many potential sources of error in this or any other public opinion poll. SSRS is an independent public opinion research firm and is a charter member of the Transparency Initiative of the American Association for Public Opinion Research.
